I've recently had the privilege to read a book entitled, "I am a Church Member" by Thom S Rainier. I've studied this book with the Thursday Morning Men's Group and our Life Group. It has brought some things to light for me about church membership and specifically about my attitude as a member of Grace Evangelical Free Church. I'll be sharing what I've learned over these next six months in the Words of Grace, and I hope it will cause you to think about your own personal church membership.

This month, we look at the *first attitude*, which we find in Chapter 1, and consider *what church membership means to you*. Now, I've never been a member of a country club, but I have had the privilege to work as a dishwasher and bus boy in one, and I've been invited to play golf with friends at several others. One similarity with all these clubs is that members have certain expectations of the staff of the country club, and are treated accordingly: Doors are held, preferred tables are reserved, towels are handed to you at the swimming pool, etc. I think you get the picture. The members are 'served'.

I've seen this attitude of 'being served' many times in the church... and not just in our church. Do any of these comments ring a bell for you?

- This is my church, so you must play the music the way I want it."
- "Look pastor, you need to know who pays your salary."
- "If you don't do this, I'll withhold my check to the church."
- "I don't pay good money to this church to listen to sermons that long."
- "I don't want my tithes to go to the ."

Hmmm. Sounds like an attitude of wanting to be served instead of serving. Are these attitudes biblical?

Not according to Paul in 1 Corinthians, chapters 12-14! If you read these chapters, it looks like Paul thought it was important to view church as a place to serve others well with fellow Christians. He compares the church to a body with many parts (Ch. 12). I Cor 12:27-28 says, "Now you are the body of Christ, and individual members of it. And God has appointed in the church first apostles, second teachers, then miracles, then gifts of healing, helping administering and various kinds of tongues."

He notes *love* to be a central attitude and action all members should have (Ch. 13). So, the giving of our money (tithing) and not serving the body is not a biblical approach. As believers, we all have been given spiritual gifts. And the Father expects us to share these gifts with His bride! If we're not sharing, we're not using these gifts. Think of the parable of the talents (Matt 25:14-30). The man who buried what was given him did not fare well.

Finally, we see in I Cor 12:12-26 that Christ's body, the church, has many parts, and each member of the body is an important part. Therefore, in order for a church to function as a whole, **ALL members** need to be a functioning part of the body.

We all have restrictions on our time, talents and treasures. But we need to prayerfully seek whether that restriction is for a selfish or fearful reason? If we all can learn to trust God with what He has given us and learn to serve Him because we love Him, our church family will be a blessing to each other as well as to the whole Fond du Lac community.

DAMASCUS "EXODUS BAGS"

Human trafficking is a huge, sometimes invisible, problem -

- · How can we help?

Did you know?...

I-41 is a major corridor from Chicago to Green Bay and on into Canada – a highway for Human Trafficking – and we are right in the middle of it!

Traffickers often prey on victims with little or no social safety net, making promises of a better, often glamorous life. They look for victims who are vulnerable, in unstable housing, with previous traumatic experiences or abuse, those who are lonely, living in poverty, are homeless or involved with gangs, sometimes with a history of sexual or substance abuse or addictions.

Here are just a few statistics:

- 50% of Human Trafficking victims are young girls, under the age of 18, often between the ages of 12-14. Women, men, and boys are also trafficked as well.
- 80% of the children are US citizens.
- Human trafficking includes not only sex exploitation, but also forced labor, in other words, modern day slavery.

Thankfully we have a local agency dedicated to fighting the evil of Human Trafficking and sex exploitation. **The Damascus Road Project,** based in Oshkosh, Wisconsin, was founded in 2009, and is committed to bringing awareness through educating, restoring,

and empowering the abused, and advocating for the prevention and elimination of sex trafficking and commercial sexual exploitation.

Staffed entirely by volunteers, this non-profit organization has over 40 years of experience working with trafficking in WI, Las Vegas and across the US, as well as abroad. Their goals are to **educate** communities and professionals using training opportunities, to **locate** and identify those being victimized, and to **advocate** for victims and offer support, compassion, encouragement, and mentorship as well as connect them with resources and services.

Their EXODUS BAG project is one way to support their clients who are coming out of trafficking. These bags are often the first, and only, things these clients have when starting over. The Missions team is inviting the Grace Church family to assist victims by collecting items for these bags, which contain basic daily necessities such as full-size shampoo and conditioner, body wash, lotion, make-up, etc. (Hotel or travel-sized products are often triggering for them, reminding them of past exploitation.) We will be collecting these items through the month of April. For a complete list, please stop by the Missions Table in the narthex. Here you will find other information on the work of the Damascus Road Project, and Human Trafficking and Sex Exploitation. This is happening right under our noses, and we don't even know it. A Note About Words from Beth Rutherford

I was so blessed by the Woman's Prayer Summit this past month. Women gathering for the sole purpose of meeting with God through prayer and worship is powerful. Not only were we encouraged and strengthened in our walk with the Lord, but we were also able to bless those around us through times of prayer for one another.

In one of our sessions a woman shared a word picture of a woman in a white wedding dress. She saw black words, like newsprint, on the dress which represented negative things that people have spoken over us. She then saw white words, representing what God says about us, covering over the negative words making the gown white again. It was a powerful visual representation of the cleansing power of God's Word and how he speaks only that which builds us up and makes us more holy. This reminds me of David's prayer in Psalm 51:7 "Purge me with hyssop, and I shall be clean; wash me, and I shall be whiter than snow."

In a later session I imagined the same idea of negative words spoken to us as stones being thrown at me. I have a choice with what I do with those rocks. Do I take them, catch them, and put them in my pocket and rub them until they are smooth? This would be the idea of holding onto what someone says about you and carrying it around in your pocket, ruminating on the words (like rubbing the stone). Or will I allow the stones to fall out of my hands or even give them to God? Can I let God remove their sting, and remind myself that other's words do not define me? Do I "destroy arguments and every lofty opinion raised against the knowledge of God, and take every thought captive to obey Christ"? We have a choice to receive or reject what others speak over us.

As I sat in prayer during one of our last sessions at the Prayer Summit, I was challenged by the two pictures and felt prompted to write a poem in reflection.


