Words of Grace





















The Talmud, the body of writings of Jewish and ceremonial law, describes seven types of Pharisees: The Shoulder Pharisee, who wore his good deeds on his shoulder for all to see; the Wait-a-little Pharisee, who always intended to good deeds but always found reason to do them later; the Bruised Pharisee, who was so holy as to not look at any woman, walking with his head down and bumping into objects; the Hump-backed Pharisee, who was so humble that he walked bent over, barely lifting his head; the Always-counting Pharisee, who was adding up his good deeds so as to put God in debt; the Fearful Pharisee, who lived terrified of God as he waited at any moment to be struck down for his sins; and lastly, the God-fearing Pharisee, who genuinely loved God and did good deeds to please him. Each of these men would have felt their behavior was justified - reflecting, through their works, a righteousness dependent upon themselves.

Jesus didn't decide which one was better than the other, although it is likely he encountered all of them. He simply went beyond the show of external behaviors to challenge us, and his listeners and disciples, to a righteousness that exceeded the righteousness of the pharisees before we would enter the kingdom of God. Matthew 5 and 6 record a lifestyle that was impossible to uphold unless we have God living inside of us. "Whoever is angry... be reconciled to your brother... then offer the gift... looking at a woman with lustful intent is tantamount to adultery... put aside divorce due to the hardness of your hearts... turn the other cheek... love your enemies." This call to God's righteousness speaks clearly to us in today's world, where the lines between good and evil are blurring, and people are more concerned with 'appearing virtuous', rather than truly *living a life that reflects God's love and righteousness*.

Jesus tells us in Matthew 5 that if we are hungry and thirsty for righteousness then we are blessed and we will be satisfied (vs 6), but thereafter points out, (vs 10) that we are also blessed if people pursue us and hunt us down ('persecute' is the word used) with the intention of destroying us - because that same hunger for righteousness offends them in their amoral or immoral lives.

So, what is the righteousness that we long for? It is the natural flow of the nature and life of God in us, visible in the "right" actions towards people.

But HOW?

Through the *Holy Spirit!*

The Holy Spirit is the power of God to work miracles in the physical world, like healing and resurrection, but is also the power of God that works in our spirit, our hidden personal world, as He turns our hearts towards God, draws us toward Jesus, and convicts us of our sin. The Holy Spirit is the one who has "confirmed our adoption as sons", intercedes for us according to the will of God, sets us free from the "law of sin and death" and makes us to be more than conquerors through Jesus who loved us.

Let us trust God, therefore, through the Holy Spirit, to complete the work He started in us until the day that Jesus returns... and we will be fully righteous!
